The story opens on such a New York City street as we meet a cast of colorful characters including Sky Masterson and Nathan Detroit - roles that originated in the movie by Marlon Brando and Frank Sinatra. Through the unlikely romance between the suave gambler Sky Masterson and the devout missionary Sarah Brown, we witness the transformative power of love and the capacity for change within us all. Students seeing Guys and Dolls will see a 1 hour 15 minute version of some of the most fun musical numbers and dialogue.

Students will see Nathan Detroit make a bet with Sky Masterson that he cannot take Miss Sarah Brown to Havana for dinner.

Students will see Sky and Sarah in Havana as tourists. They drink milkshakes from coconut cups in Havana while others dance. Sarah and Sky join the dancing which ultimately results in a big fight with someone being hit with a breakaway bottle.

Students will see gangsters dancing and singing in the sewer. They will see dancing that resembles throwing dice, but will not see any actual dice or gambling games.

Students will see money and IOU markers being thrown in a dance.

Students will not see any actual drinking or referencing of alcohol.

Students will see Horse racing signs on newspapers and a news stand.

Students will not see any characters kissing
